October is also the month that the board of directors retires or returns to you a portion of your capital credits. Capital credits are the revenues that remain at the end of the year once all expenses are paid. These revenues, or margins, are then assigned to members based on the amount of energy consumed during the year. Annually, the board retires a portion of these capital credits and members will see a credit on their electric bill. It's just another way that cooperatives add value back to their members. # **BOARD MEETING SUMMARY**

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at the headquarters in Rosholt at 7:50 a.m. on July 25, 2019. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the June 27, 2019 meeting, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety and compliance report were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were approved. Finance Committee reviewed checks written and the board and CEO expenses.
- b. The board approved proposed changes to 6.0 Disconnection and Reconnection of the Service Rules and Regulations. The committee is reviewing Estate Retirement of Capital Credits and will have more to report at future meetings.
- c. The board approved the modifications to the service availability fee due to recent programming changes with NISC to Residential Service, Controlled Lake and Pond Aerator, and Residential Time-of-Use Service Schedules.
- d. Lila Shower reported on the 10-year financial forecast, highlighting the West Riverside credit beginning in 2020.
- e. The board approved changing the mission statement to "We are your trusted energy partner and provider of valued community support."
- f. Mike Wade gave an overview of the action items the management staff is working on for the Strategic Goals. Two

- will be presented at each of the upcoming board meetings in July, August, and September. Action plans will then be assigned in October to staff.
- g. Mike Wade presented bylaws, policies and guidelines regarding corporate sponsorships and donations through CWEC's Operation Round Up, Federated Youth Foundation, and corporate sponsorships.

Operations and Engineering - Mike Wade covered the Engineering/Operations report, noting discussions are taking place concerning the future of the Tigerton Tower. Updates will be provided in the future.

Accounting and Finance – Reviewed the reports submitted. Lila Shower reported ATC issued a check from the Mid-Wisconsin DBS sale that will be split between Adams Columbia Electric Cooperative and CWEC.

Member Services - Brenda Mazemke reported due to the storm damage and her needs here in the office, she was not able to attend Youth Leadership Congress. The students from our area still attended, thanks to the parents who transported their children to ACEC, and the co-ops that stepped up to chaperone our group. The Facebook page likes have increased by over 600 this week due to the updates on the power outages to our members.

President and CEO – Mike Wade reported discussions are being held regarding methods used for locating underground cable. We will begin stocking LED lights for future installations. CEO Wade announced he has been elected to the WECA Board of Directors.
