A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at the headquarters in Rosholt at 8 a.m. on February 28, 2019. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the January 31, 2019 meeting, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety and compliance report were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly financial statements and reports were approved. Finance Committee reviewed checks written and the board and CEO expenses.
- b. The Governance Committee reviewed service rules for transformer neutral isolation and an interruptible rate rider.
- c. The board was presented information on the allocation and retirement options for capital credits.
- d. The board selected the voting delegate and alternate voting delegate for the NRECA Director Election to be held at the WECA Education and Lobby Days in Madison on March 26, 2019.
- e. The board approved the sale of a used bucket truck to North Central Technical College to be used in their linemen training program.

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EMPLOYEE COMPLETES APPRENTICESHIP, EARNS JOURNEY STATUS

CWEC employee Mackenzie (Mack) Yarbrough recently graduated from a four-year indentured lineworker apprentice program offered through Chippewa Valley Technical College in Eau Claire. Mack celebrated with 64 new apprentices who completed the Wisconsin lineworker or meter technician apprenticeship programs.

The Electrical Lineman Apprenticeship Program consists of four years of not less than 8,000 hours in which a minimum of 640 hours is spent in paid-related instruction. As an apprentice, Yarbrough completed the training to achieve his status as a journey electric lineworker.

"We are proud to see Mack complete his apprenticeship," said Kevin Kurtzweil, Central Wisconsin vice president of operations. "The training and knowledge he has received since joining our co-op will help him perform highly skilled work on our high-voltage electric distribution system."
