Job Description: My job is to bring to our members a variety of programs, services and products to enhance their lives.

I'm thinking about replacing some of the windows in my home. My neighbor tells me he received a rebate for windows he put in his home—are there rebates available?



Yes there are. Your cooperative offers a variety of incentives designed to make our members' home energy efficiency projects more affordable. In your case we do offer a \$25 rebate per

window replaced and a \$25 rebate for replacing an exterior door, up to 50 percent of the cost with a \$250 maximum.

I thought you might want to see what other incentives we offer, so here is a summary.

Energy Star Appliances CWEC members are eligible for a \$25 rebate for each qualifying Energy Star rated appliance purchase made.

Heating & Cooling We currently offer a \$100 rebate for the purchase of a new gas or oil furnace equipped with ECM motor. Rebates are also available for heat pumps and boilers. If you purchase a central air conditioner system with a SEER rating of 15 or greater, you can receive a \$100 rebate.

Weatherization If an insulation or air-sealing project is in your plans, we can help. Rebates of up to \$250 are available.

Lighting LED is a highly energy efficient lighting technology, and has the potential to fundamentally change the future of lighting in the United States. Residential LEDs—especially ENERGY STAR rated products—use at least 75 percent less energy, and last 25 times longer, than incandescent lighting. CWEC members are eligible for 50 percent (maximum \$75) of the cost to convert to LED lighting.

Energy Audits A home energy audit, also known as a home energy assessment, is the first step to assess how much energy your home consumes and to evaluate what measures you can take to make your home more energy efficient. An assessment will show you problems that may, when corrected, save you significant amounts of money over time. To assist you we've

partnered with state-certified auditors and offer incentives that, in most cases, pay for the cost of the audit.

Water Heaters In conjunction with your cooperative's load management program, we're pleased to offer rebated or, in some cases, free water heaters. Additional rebates are available for heat pump and solar water heaters.

Renewable Energy Your cooperative is a strong supporter of renewable energy. Incentives of up to \$1,500 are available for residential solar and wind systems.

Farm & Business Projects We offer a wide range of incentives for farm and business energy efficiency upgrades. Please contact us for more details.

How to Apply For most rebates all we need is a copy of the receipt of purchase. For Energy Star appliance purchases please submit a copy of the receipt and proof the appliance is Energy Star rated (a copy of the Energy Guide label is perfect). Please contact us for more information on energy audits, water heaters, and renewable energy incentives.

Capital Credits for Conservation Additional assistance for your energy efficiency project might be available through the Capital Credits for Conservation Program. With this program you can "cash in" your capital credits for qualifying projects such as window replacement, weatherization, and heat pumps. Please contact us for more information.

OPERATION ROUND UP APPROVES \$3,500 IN DONATIONS

The Operation Round Up Trust Board recently approved donations totaling \$3,500. Those receiving donations included: Iola Lioness (Post Prom Party), Scandinavia Volunteer Fire Department (equipment purchases), NIC Foundation (Anti-bullying Character Camps), Tigerton Main Street (headquarters improvements), Iola Historical Society (various projects), Tigerton Community Garden (fencing), Iola Lioness (youth Easter party), and two family hardship donations.

"We continue to be amazed by the amount of good this program does," said Co-op Vice President of Member Relations Mark Forseth.

Funded by volunteer donations from Co-op members, Operation Round Up

provides funds for worthwhile causes, including member hardship cases, educational purposes including scholarships, and charitable organizations. In addition, \$17,675 in scholarships was awarded to 84 college-bound students.

Members who choose to participate have their electric bill "rounded up" to the next highest dollar. For example, a \$95.52 bill becomes \$96. On average the amount contributed is 50 cents per month, or \$6 a year. The monies collected are turned over to a ninemember volunteer Trust Board (one member from each of the co-op's nine sub-districts) that administers the program. Current Trust Board members are Marie Skowen, Sheri Beilke, Marlene Wepner, Gary Kolodziej, Renee Gro-

shek, Maxine Lemke, Bonnie Paulson, Sue Halverson, and Clifford Kessen.

"The success of Operation Round Up is due in large part to the volunteer efforts of the Trust Board," said Forseth. "On behalf of the co-op I'd like to thank all current and past board members."

"Operation Round Up has exceeded our expectations as we've been able to provide over \$235,500 to families in need and charitable organizations along with providing 700 scholarships totaling over \$215,000. This brings the total amount given out to a remarkable \$450,618," said Forseth. "We'd like to thank all of the co-op members that contribute to the program for making it the success it is."

As you find yourself spending more time outdoors this summer, Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) reminds you to exercise caution near electrical equipment maintained by the co-op.

Substations and power lines carry extremely high voltages, and if contact is accidentally made, the results can be dangerous—or even deadly.

Never climb trees near power lines. If you make contact with a tree that is touching a power line, your body could become the path of electricity from the line to the ground. If you encounter an animal trapped in a tree near power lines or inside a substation, do not attempt to remove it—no matter how furry and cute! Call CWEC or 911 for assistance.

These days, we are seeing more remote-controlled toys, like drones and airplanes, which can be a great way to have fun outdoors. But these gadgets also bring new safety concerns. Remote-controlled toys should never be flown near power lines, substations, or other electrical equipment.

Remember these safety tips when flying a remote-controlled toy:

- Keep a safe distance from electrical equipment when you
 fly. If contact is accidentally made with a power line or a
 transformer inside a substation, many members of your
 community could be left without electricity.
- Keep the remote-controlled toy in sight at all times.
- Avoid flying if weather conditions are unfavorable. High winds could cause you to lose control of the remotecontrolled toy.
