BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

The September regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held on September 30, 2021 at 8:04 a.m. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the August 26, 2021 meeting, new and terminated memberships, monthly safety and compliance report, and estate capital credit retirements were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were approved. Finance Committee reviewed checks written and the board and CEO expenses.
- b. The Governance Committee did not meet this month. A meeting is planned for next month.
- c. The board reviewed Board Policy 202 Director Fees and Expenses and made no recommendation for changes.
- d. The board approved the capital credit retirement for 2021 in the amount of \$350,000.
- e. The board approved the attendees and voting delegates for the WECA Annual Meeting scheduled for November 10-11, 2021

in Stevens Point, WI.

- f. The board approved the director attendees and voting delegates for the 2022 director conference schedule.
- g. Mr. Wade gave an informational presentation to the board on industry standard outage incidents.

Operations and Engineering – Mr. Kurtzweil reported MJ Construction has completed the grounding at the Tigerton substation, and we are waiting on the contractor to complete the graveling and driveway. Chapman Metering has completed the CT meter testing at the Iola and Sannes substations. Zielies is back helping us with vegetation management after returning from helping with hurricane clean up down south.

Accounting and Finance – Financial reports were reviewed. Ms. Shower reported filing of paperwork has been completed from the July 2021 storm to the Marathon County Disaster Recovery Program.

Member Services – Ms. Mazemke's report was reviewed by Mr. Wade.

President and CEO – Mike Wade, CEO, reported on his submitted report.

HOLIDAY DÉCOR TIPS FOR AN ENERGY-WISE HOME

Whether you've already decked your halls or you're just getting started, there's still time to incorporate energy savings into your holiday décor planning.

If you haven't strung your twinkle lights yet, be sure to use LED light strands. LEDs consume far less energy than incandescent lights and they can last 40 holiday seasons. They're also safer because they're made with epoxy lenses, not glass, making them more resistant to breaking-and they're cool to the touch, so no burnt fingers.

If you missed Santa's memo about energy-saving LEDs and your holiday lights are already up, you can still save on lighting costs. All you need is a programmable light timer. Most models cost between \$10 to \$25 and can be purchased

through online retailers like Amazon or at big box stores like Lowe's or Wal-Mart. With a light timer, you can easily program when you want your holiday lights turned on and off, which will save you time, money, and energy. If you're using

a timer for exterior lighting, make sure it's weatherproof and intended for outdoor use.

If Clark Griswold's décor style is a bit much for your taste, consider a more natural approach. Many Christmas tree farms, and even retailers like Lowe's and Home Depot, give away greenery clippings from recently trimmed trees. With a little twine, extra ornaments and sparkly ribbon, you can create beautiful garlands and wreaths to hang over your front door or windows. To add extra twinkle at night, you can install solar-powered spotlights to illuminate your new (essentially free) greenery. Solar spotlights can vary in price, but you should be able to purchase a quality set of four for about \$30-and because they run on natural energy from the sun, there's

no additional cost to your energy bill.

Regardless of how you decorate your home for the holidays, there are plenty of ways to save energy throughout the season.

RECYLCE YOUR BROKEN CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

This program is funded through public benefits and federal dollars to help eligible low-income households pay for home energy assistance and weatherization. Members may be eligible if they meet the HE+ program guidelines. Members should contact their local agency to determine eligibility.
