I want to spend the rest of this column discussing "community solar" leg-

islation that has resurfaced at the State Capitol. Rob Richard, WECA president and CEO, touched on this topic in his Message from the CEO column in last month's issue of *Wisconsin Energy Cooperative News*, but I'd like to reiterate a few points that Richard made.

Even though electric cooperatives would remain exempt under the current bill, electric cooperatives remain opposed to the bill. The reason for the opposition is the possibility that that bill could have long-term consequences for Wisconsin's electric consumers.

The electric cooperatives in Wisconsin tend to be located primarily in rural and agricultural areas, which are areas that third-party entities tend to try to develop solar projects. This is due to land being more readily available and less expensive.

While electric cooperatives are not opposed to working with private solar developers, we do it with our members in mind.

As Richard explained in his article,

"The legislation creates artificially high prices for power produced by community solar systems, offset by what other customers pay for their service. It also shifts hidden costs to utilities – the responsibility and expense of providing subscribers with power at all times, which requires personnel, poles, wires, substations, and generation. It leaves utilities with all the obligations, and developers with all the rewards and minimal risk. It also limits the Public Service Commission's ability to provide stronger consumer protections for subscribers signing 25-year contracts."

This isn't a business model that cooperatives follow. Cooperatives consider the financial well-being of all its members when making business decisions.

From all of us at CWEC, we are proud to be of service to you. We hope that you and your family are healthy and safe during this holiday season. We wish you a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at 7:49 a.m. on September 18, 2025. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, meeting minutes of August 26, 2025, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety and compliance report were approved.

Action Items

- Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were reviewed by the Finance Committee.
- The Governance Committee reviewed Policy 407, Sale of Material and Equipment and the Pole Release Form. No changes were recommended and the Board agreed.
- Director Zander will be the voting Delegate for RESCO's Annual Meeting on September 24, 2025.

Operations and Engineering – Mr. Kurtzweil submitted a written report. Crews will begin work on the first grant project on September 22, 2025. The line crew has been working on new connects, work plan projects and a stray voltage study for a member. A request to start the process of replacing Truck 37 was tabled and will be discussed in executive session.

Accounting and Finance – Financial reports were presented by Ms. Claussen. The PCA for August was -\$0.00570. Work continues on the budget documents for 2026.

Member Services – Mr. Lehman submitted a written report. The 2026 calendar has been designed and is currently at the printer. It will be available to members at the Member Appreciation Breakfast on Saturday, October 25, 2025.

President and CEO – Lila Shower, President and CEO, reported on her submitted report.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:16 p.m.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIP OF THE MONTH

To maximize your fireplace's efficiency, always keep the damper closed when the fireplace is not in use. An open damper is like an open window, allowing warm indoor air to escape and cold air to enter. Consider installing a fireplace insert, which improves heat output by circulating warm air into the room rather than letting it escape up the chimney. Also, burn only seasoned hardwood to ensure a hotter, cleaner burn. Regularly clean and inspect your chimney to maintain safe and efficient operation.

CHECK LIGHT STRANDS AND OTHER DECORATIONS FOR SIGNS OF WEAR AND TEAR

While decorating can be one more thing to mark off an extensive holiday to-do list, take a little extra time when using electrical light strands or other plug-in decorations and while using a ladder.

Holiday decorating-related injuries include those caused by falls, cuts and back strains, although they can also be related to electrical hazards. For example, "do not use a staple or nail to hang light strands, and always be aware of overhead power line locations when carrying or using ladders or stringing lights," says Erin Hollinshead, executive director of Safe Electricity.

"Like with any home task, it is best to take your time, think before you start and make safety a priority, which includes assessing the condition of lights and other decorations powered by electricity," she added.

Be on the lookout for damaged light strands, plugs and electrical cords, and discard items that are cracked, old or frayed. Safe Electricity provides these additional holiday decorating safety tips:

- When decorating outside, be aware of overhead power lines. Imagine a 10-foot circle around a power line, and do not let any body part or item (such as light strands or a ladder) enter that 10-foot area.
- When securing light strands, do not nail them into place; instead, use plastic hooks.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands that can be daisy chained (plugged into one another).

- Make sure lights and extension cords are properly rated; that is, those that are used outside should be rated for outdoor use.
- Before hanging lights, check the strands for broken bulbs as well as fraying or bare wires that could present electrical hazards. Always discard damaged strands.
- Turn off all lights before leaving home or going to sleep or ensure they are timed to do so.
- Do not run cords under carpets, through doorways or in a way that could cause a tripping hazard.
- Plug lights and decorations that are used outdoors into an outlet with ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) protection. GFCIs detect and prevent dangerous situations where an electric shock could occur.
- When using holiday lights, whether indoors or out, look for certification by an accredited independent testing laboratory such as Underwriters Laboratories.
- Puppies and other pets love to chew on electrical cords, including light strands and extension cords. Keep cords out of sight or hidden with a cord cover.
- Be careful when using extension cords around crawling babies and toddlers. Check for long electrical cords that span the floor and secure them with cord covers to avoid hazards.

We are once again having a Christmas coloring contest this year.


The contest is open to all kids ages 10 and under. Draw a picture of something related to Christmas, and mail or bring it to:
