BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

The December regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held on December 29, 2022 at 8:00 a.m. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, minutes of the November 30, 2022 meeting, new and terminated memberships, monthly safety and compliance report, and estate capital credit retirements were approved.

Action Items

- a. The board held a telephone conference call with an ex-member of the coop regarding their capital credit allocation balance.
- b. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were approved. Finance Committee reviewed checks written and the board and CEO expenses.
- c. The board approved proposed wording change to Board Policy 106-Director Education and Training. The board also approved the proposed changes to 2.0 Terms and Conditions for Service, Section 2.5.8-Distributed Generation as well as adding the DG fees to Appendix A-Schedule of Fees and Deposits.
- d. The board reviewed Board Policy 503 Dispute Resolution and made no recommended changes.
- e. The board approved the bad debt write-offs for 2022 in the amount of \$16,777.47.
- f. The board approved the WRIV credit percentage for 2023 that will be returned to the membership in the form of a power cost adjustment (PCA).
- g. Tyler Tautges, operations intern and Wisconsin delegate to NRECA's

Youth Leadership Council, gave a presentation to the board. Tyler will be representing Wisconsin at the NRECA PowerXchange Conference in Nashville, TN in March.

- h. The board approved ATC's First Call for Voluntary Additional Capital Contributions in 2023 in the amount of \$13,728.00.
- i. The board approved the following members to fill vacancies on the Member Advisory Group (MAG):
 - Carolyn Jolitz Sub District 1C John Phillips – Sub District 2A Mike Wilhite – Sub District 2C
- j. The board approved the 2023 Annual Goals and Financial Budget with the budget reductions as presented. Employees are encouraged to monitor expenditures closely and share cost-saving ideas with their manager.

Operations – Kevin Kurtzweil reported crews are done with underground work for this year and have started hazard recognition inspections. Operations will be working on year-end inventory next week. Crews did an excellent job handling the outages last weekend.

Accounting and Finance – Financial Reports were reviewed. Lila Shower reviewed the capital credit allocation we received from NISC.

Member Services – Brenda Mazemke reported on the successful emailing of CWEC's Electric Line Newsletter electronically. Next month there will be an update on the Toys for Tots numbers from this year.

Administrative Services - Lori Patoka reviewed submitted report and had no updates.

President and CEO – Mike Wade, CEO, reported on his submitted report. Meeting adjourned at 2:02 p.m.

MANY FACTORS CONTRIBUTE TO COST OF ELECTRICITY

hen providing electricity to the members of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC), it is our goal to provide members with the highest quality of service at the lowest possible cost. Sometimes outside forces, such as inflation and the rising cost of natural

gas and coal, hinder that effort. We have tried to protect our members from market volatility while still ensuring the reliable delivery of electricity.

Even though the cost of energy we

purchase from Alliant Energy to meet the energy needs of our members has increased over the past couple years, we have worked to keep our electricity rates stable. Much of the increase in the cost of energy is due to the increase in the cost of natural gas and coal. Our investment in West Riverside Energy Center in Beloit has helped in our effort to keep rates stable.

Supply-chain issues, which have been present since the COVID pandemic hit, have dramatically increased the cost of materials we use. It has also increased the amount of time for such materials to be delivered, forcing us to change how we source material. In order to keep electricity flowing, we must maintain inventories that allow us to be prepared to respond to storms and other emergencies that can deplete our stock of material in a short amount of time. Because suppliers can no longer guarantee a short turnaround time on an order, we must keep more inventory, which requires an outlay of funds.

Higher diesel and gasoline prices over the past couple years have also been burdensome.

We have not changed our rates since 2016, and while CWEC is strong financially, we have to maintain pace with the market forces that are impacting us. Because of that, members can expect a rate change this year.

The co-op recently had Cooperative Finance Corporation of Dulles, Virginia, complete a cost-of-service study. The cost-of-service study was also reviewed by a consultant from Power System Engineering in Madison, who will make rate change recommendations.

> The board will review the rate study and consider rate change recommendations when it meets for its February meeting. The purpose of the rate study is to determine whether the existing rates are sufficient to enable the

cooperative to provide quality service to its members while meeting its service obligations to its lenders. The rate study is a necessary responsibility of management and the CWEC Board of Directors to ensure that the co-op continues to operate in a financially sound manner.

While a rate study is complicated, one of the purposes of the study is to help determine what revenue will be required to fund the operation of the cooperative for the foreseeable future, and what is the fairest way to collect that revenue through rates.

We value each and every one of our members, and as we move to adjust the rates for electricity, our goal remains to provide safe and reliable service at the lowest possible cost. Since we are a nonprofit, our rates are designed not to make a profit, but to simply cover the costs of providing that power.

SCH CO-OP SCH ARSHIPS

OPERATION ROUND UP SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

S cholarships will be available to college, vocational, and technical school bound students through the Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) Operation Round Up program. Both traditional and nontraditional students are encouraged to apply.

To be eligible, either the student or parents must have their primary residence located on CWEC lines and participate in Operation Round Up. Applications are available from high school guidance counselors and online at www.cwecoop.com (Member Services tab).

The deadline for submitting completed applications is **Saturday, April 1, 2023**.

Scholarship winners must maintain a minimum 2.0 grade point average and full-time student equivalent during their first quarter or semester of college or vocational-technical school. Payment will be made upon completion of the first quarter or semester of college, vocational, or technical school and will be issued to the student. The recipient will need to provide CWEC with a copy of their grades and proof of enrollment for the second semester.

Since the CWEC Operation Round Up scholarship program began in 2005 CWEC has provided more than



\$275,000 in scholarships to area students. Giving back to the community is one of the cooperative principles; furthering the education of its members is another.

APPLICANTS SOUGHT FOR ELECTRIC UTILITY WORKER SCHOLARSHIP

To encourage students to consider a career at an electric utility, and to create an incentive for trained electric utility workers to seek employment with electric cooperatives or other utilities, Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) has established a scholarship in the amount of \$1,000. The scholarship is intended to assist a student pursuing a technical college education



in an electric program that lends itself to employment in the electric utility industry.

Traditional and nontraditional students are encouraged to apply.

Applicants need not be a member of CWEC, but preference will be given to CWEC members. The scholarship is administered by the CWEC Operation Round Up Trust Committee. The committee will evaluate all applications and essay responses. The selection criteria will be based on scholastic achievement, school and community involvement, work history, and essay submission.
