the country bring to co-op members and the communities they serve.

October is also the month that the cooperative returns to you a portion of your capital credits. Capital credits are the revenues that remain at the end of the year once all expenses are paid. These revenues or margins are then assigned to members based on the amount of energy consumed during the year. Annually, the board approves the retirement of a portion of these capital credits and members see a credit on their electric bill. It's just another way that cooperatives add value back to their members.

On a sad note, Wisconsin electric cooperatives have had their first work fatality in more than 40 years. Scenic Rivers Energy Cooperative lineworker Derrick Heisz, 45, died August 24 when he came into contact with an energized line. A total of 30 bucket trucks from 20 electric cooperatives in Wisconsin, as
