In the June issue of *Wisconsin Electric Cooperative News*, we informed you that Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) had been awarded almost \$1.3 million in grant funds as part of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021, also known as the bi-partisan infrastructure law.

CWEC had originally applied for grant funding in February 2024.

I am happy to inform our members that we have been given the green light to start the grant projects. With the green

light to proceed, in late September we began the project of converting 2.5 miles of overhead lines to a three-phase underground line along Fairview Road in the townships of Bartelme and Almon in Shawano County. This line feeds the Stockbridge-Munsee Community.

By converting this line from overhead to underground, it will make the infrastructure more resilient to natural hazards. This will help with preventing long power outages in the Stockbridge-Munsee area like the long outage in 2022 after a tornado hit the area.

The co-op received slightly more than \$400,000 in grant funds for this project.

Once that project is completed, the co-op will begin the second project that it was awarded grant funds for. This project, which the co-op received almost \$900,000 in grant funds for, will provide a tie-in between CWEC's Wittenberg and Groenier substations. The tie-in will give the co-op another tie-in option, as well as the opportunity to back feed electricity. This will mean less time co-op members serviced by those substations will be out of power when there are power outages.



Work began in late September to bury an electric line underground on a 2.5-mile stretch on Fairview Road. Part of the cost of the project will be paid for with a grant that CWEC was previously awarded.

BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative was held at 8:00 a.m. on August 26, 2025. The following is a summary of the meeting activities. The agenda, meeting minutes of July 31, 2025, new and terminated memberships, and the monthly safety and compliance report were approved.

Action Items

- a. Monthly Financial Statements and Reports were reviewed by the Finance Committee.
- b. The Governance Committee reviewed Policy 406, Corporate Contributions and Sponsorships. A motion was made and seconded to remove "As a Touchstone Energy Cooperative", from the Purpose Section. Motion carried.
- c. A motion was made and seconded to add a new rate of \$12.25 for 101 watt bulbs. Motion carried.
- d. A motion was made and seconded to nominate Director Zander as the NRECA District 5 Voting Delegate for CFC Candidates. Motion carried.
- e. A motion was made and seconded to nominate Director Onesti as the Voting Delegate for the Annual WECA Meeting.

Operations and Engineering—Mr. Kurtzweil's written report was submitted in his absence.

Accounting and Finance—Financial reports were presented by Ms. Claussen. The PCA for July was -\$0.00635.

Member Services—Mr. Lehman's written report was submitted in his absence.

President and CEO—Lila Shower, President and CEO, reported on her submitted report.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 a.m.



CO-OP RETIRES \$300,000 IN CAPITAL CREDITS

What are Capital Credits?

One of the benefits of being a member of Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) is that members are eligible to receive capital credits, which represents your ownership in CWEC.

Unlike investor-owned utilities that maximize profits to pay dividends to shareholders, CWEC, which is a not-for-profit electric cooperative, provides our members with “at cost” electric service. We do not exist to earn a profit.

When each year’s finances are audited and closed out, the remaining profit or margins are allocated to the members based on the amount each member paid for electricity during the year in the form of capital credits. These capital credits are used by the co-op to help build and maintain the CWEC electric system. When the co-op’s finances permit, the Board of Directors approves a portion of the allocated capital credits to be retired, and paid back to you – the members.

Allocation of Retired Capital Credits

This year, the board of directors approved the retirement of \$300,000 in capital credits. The retirement will involve capital credits from the 2019 allocations and prior.

Active members whose retired capital credits were less than \$100 received a credit on their September electric bill, which was mailed to members in October. Checks were mailed in October to active members whose retired capital credits amounted to more than \$100. Checks, with a minimum of \$10, were also mailed to all offline members who received retired capital credits.
