ENERGY CONSERVATION REWARDS INCREASED

Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC), your cooperative, offers energy conservation rebates through its Energy Conservation Rewards program. As of January 1, 2024, many of these offerings have increased for energy efficiency purchases including home heating and cooling fixtures, insulation, and Energy Star rated appliances.

For 2024, CWEC will no longer offer electric water heaters for sale to its membership. There have also been changes to the rebates offered for electric water heaters because of this. The cooperative is currently offering the following incentives for water heaters. To qualify for an incentive, the water heater must have a 50-gallon capacity.

She said she is interested to see what things are similar between the healthcare and energy industries, as well as what things are completely different.




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CLEARING THE PATH TO RELIABILITY

Reliability

Keeping power lines clear of overgrown vegetation improves service reliability. After all, we've seen the whims of Mother Nature during severe weather events with fallen tree limbs taking down power lines and utility poles. While many factors can impact power disruptions, about half of all outages can be attributed to overgrown vegetation. This is why you sometimes see CWEC crews or contractors out in the community trimming trees near power lines. Our trimming crews have been trained and certified based on the latest industry standards.

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BE SAFE AROUND ICE AND IN THE COLD

This winter's weather has

been a wild ride.

Fluctuating temperatures across the state have caused both snowmobile trail and ice conditions to change regularly. Be prepared for the elements by checking conditions before you head out.

If your plans include access to or use of an icecovered waterbody, contact your local fishing clubs, bait shops or



outfitters for ice conditions. Remember that no ice is safe ice.

If your plans include snowmobiling, check trail conditions with local snowmobile clubs or on Travel Wisconsin's Snow Report: https://www.travelwisconsin.com/snowreport/snowmobile

And if the snowmobile trail you had your heart set on is closed, don't trespass or ride off-trail.

ICE SAFETY

Think twice before going near cold water or ice, especially with the fluctuating temperatures we're seeing around Wisconsin.


