# TODD PAMPERIN ELECTED TO CWEC BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Living in the northern portion of the township of Wyoming, Todd Pamperin, of Tigerton, said he knows how important electricity is to rural areas. That importance was one of the reasons he decided to run for a seat on the Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors.

"Electricity is one that I think a lot of people take for granted," Pamperin said. "I wanted to know more than just flipping a switch on and there's electricity."

Another reason he ran for a seat on the CWEC Board of Directors was to give back to the co-op members in his district – District 2.

The election for the vacant seat was contested, as Nathan Reichle was also on the ballot. Pamperin said he knew Reichle and had a good relationship with him. When the results of the election were announced at the CWEC 87<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting, Pamperin had received 195 votes, while Reichle had received 149.

Since Reichle had run for a seat on the board the previous year but was defeated, Pamperin said he was surprised when he heard he had received the most votes.

"I thought that the second time through, that it was going to be his (Reichle) chance," Pamperin said.




and develop their leadership skills. It is planned by high school students and features nationally recognized speakers.

# FOURTH-GRADERS LEARN HOW TO BE SAFE AROUND ELECTRICITY

To help promote
Electrical Safety Month
in May, Central
Wisconsin Electric
Cooperative (CWEC)
once again provided
electricity safety
demonstrations to
fourth grade students
at six elementary
schools in the CWEC
service area.
Elementary schools
included those located



in Birnamwood, Bowler, Iola, Rosholt, Tigerton, and Wittenberg.

The demonstrations were conducted by CWEC linemen, and showed students firsthand the dangers that could occur if they aren't safe around electricity. Students learned about some of the safety equipment a lineman has to wear when they work around power lines. They were also shown examples of what overhead and underground power lines look like, and learned why they are constructed the way they are. Linemen also showed the students what happens if a tree branch, kite string, and fishing line come in contact with a power line.

"It's important for students to understand how dangerous electricity can be, and that they should never go near a downed power line or something that is in contact with a power line," said Bert Lehman, member relations specialist at CWEC. "During the classroom demonstrations, students see smoke, sparks, and flames, which help to reinforce that they need to stay away from power lines."

To help convey how dangerous electricity is, one of the demonstrations used a hot dog to simulate what would happen if a human body contacted a power line.
