## **SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS**

One of the signs that summer is coming to an end is when kids return to school. While kids may dread it, and parents may be rejoicing, the start of a new school year also brings back dangers that motorists need to be aware of. These dangers focus on school buses being back on the road.

For parents, it is important to talk with your child, or children, about bus safety. Here are some tips:

#### **Before the Bus Arrives**

Your child should arrive at the



bus stop at least five minutes before the bus arrives. Ahead of the new school year, visit the bus stop and show your child where to wait for the bus, at least 10 feet — five giant steps — away from the curb. Remind your child that the bus stop is not a place to run or play.

#### **Getting On and Off Safely**

When the school bus arrives, your child should wait until the bus comes to a complete stop, the door opens, and the driver says it's okay to get on or off. Your child should use the handrails to avoid falling.

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**INSTALLATION OF NEW METER SYSTEM HAS BEGUN** 

The installation of a new meter system for Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative (CWEC) started in August, when new meters began to be installed as part of a pilot program of 178 meters in the area of the Iola substation. Once installed and operational, information from the meters can be transmitted to the CWEC office and downloaded. Residential meters can be read every



hour, while commercial meters can be read every 15 minutes.

CWEC has contracted with Allegiant Utility Services to swap out the old meters with the new meters. When the technician from Allegiant arrives at a property to install the new meter, he will knock on the door of the residence to inform the resident he is there to install the new meter. He will also give the resident a door hanger notifying them that the new meter has been installed. The only disruption to power should be a "blink" when the old meter is switched to the new meter.

#### STAY FOCUSED ON SAFETY DURING HARVEST SEASON

It's right around the corner – harvest season. The time of the year that can be an exciting and exhausting time, the culmination of a season of hard work. However, the rush to harvest can also yield tragic outcomes. Each year, dozens of farm workers are killed and hundreds are injured in accidents involving power lines and electrical equipment.

Putting safety first requires alertness, focus and knowledge of potential hazards and safety steps. Regardless of the technology used on the farm, keep the following electrical safety guidelines in mind:


- Use a spotter when operating large machinery near power lines. Do not let the spotter touch the machinery while it is being moved anywhere near power lines.
- Keep equipment at least 10 feet from power lines above, below and to the side – a 360-degree rule.
- Look up and use care when moving any equipment such as extending augers or raising the bed of grain trucks around power lines.

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## **GRAIN BINS - HARVESTING SAFELY**

At Central Wisconsin Electric Cooperative safety is a top priority for all – our employees and our members.

Farmers work hard to get the job done, and sometimes it's easy to forget all the necessary steps to take when practicing safe



operations. Safety regulations should always be considered when working around grain bins.

Whether you're purchasing new grain bins or remodeling areas that contain existing ones, proximity to overhead power lines must be a considered factor. The National Electrical Safety Code requires an 18-foot minimum clearance from the highest point of the filling port of the grain bin to nearby high-voltage wires and a 55-foot minimum distance from the power line to the grain bin wall. See the chart in the upper right for further guidelines. Changes to landscaping and drainage work can affect clearance heights of power lines, so please remember to check these measurements regularly.

Before moving or building a grain bin, please contact the co-op so we may help you determine a safe clearance envelope between the bin and power lines.
